BYOMM seeks to raise awareness about depression and the impact of issues related to stress. Both organizations brought awareness to the signs and symptoms of mental illness, while celebrating and sharing the good news that mental illness can be treated and managed to the citizens of the Clarksville, TN community as they viewed the literature on display at the event. The representatives of Omega Psi Phi and Delta Sigma Theta provided vital information at the event that raised awareness and educated the community about mental health and also assisted in the ongoing effort to reduce the stigma of mental health in our communities. All chapters of Omega Psi Phi and Delta Sigma Theta will take the lead in communicating the importance of seeking help for mental health conditions and emphasizing that help and treatment are available so that no one has to suffer in silence. It is the goal that once this information is shared with members of the community, they will in turn become carriers of the message to their family and friends.

Austin Wright began the discussion by talking with the youth about the importance of education and why it is imperative they strive to do their very best in every aspect of their studies. Operation Compassion



Brothers from Theta Alpha Alpha collaborated with Operation Compassion in Cleveland, TN to receive a shipment of disaster blankets. Operation Compassion is an international and domestic humanitarian organization which delivers critical aid assisting 25 million people every year. Through Operation Compassion we received 68 boxes of blankets which totaled 544 individual blankets. All 544 blankets were donated to HOTEL Inc., Helping Others Through Extending Love In The Name of Christ, a local agency specializing in aiding the misfortunate. They provide pathways for stable housing, community resources, relationship building, quality food and services to the neighbors. HOTEL Inc. provides hot meals to the homeless and the necessities for the homeless in the Bowling Green, KY area. Hotel Inc. partnered with a local

storage unit where they were able to store all 68 boxes of blankets for their use throughout the year. As the homeless population in Bowling Green continues to grow, in 2015 there were 72 people that were classified as homeless. These individuals live under bridges, in fields, cars, warehouses, train cars, sheds and in barns on other people's property. to Kentucky Housing Corporation, Bowling Green has the highest population of homeless in the Barren River Area of the State. Temperatures in Bowling Green can fall below 30 degrees with wind chill in the negative numbers. The blankets will be beneficial for those living in unsubstantial conditions. There have been 14 natural disasters in the county. These disasters include floods, storms, tornadoes and earthquakes. HOTEL Inc. will be prepared to assist in the event that these happen again.

First Fraternity Monument on WKU's Campus

The Gamma Theta Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity hosted a monument dedication service. This event took place between the famous Kissing Bridge and Garrett Hall on the campus of Western Kentucky University. Gamma Theta is the first Historically Black Greek Letter Organization at a predominately white institution south of the Mason-Dixon Line.



Gamma Theta is also the first Fraternity on the campus of WKU to have a monument. The dedication was well attended by Fraternity leaders, city officials, and the President of WKU, Gary Ransdell. Brother Kenneth Barnes, Director of Omega Psi Phi's International Headquarters, and Brother Bryan White, 5th District Representative for Omega Psi Phi also blessed us with their presence. In addition to these elite guest others present were students, faculty and staff and a host of visitors. Theta Alpha Alpha, the graduate chapter of Omega Psi Phi in Bowling Green, KY played a key role in seeing this project to fruition. Through the vision of Brothers Andrew Jackson and Paul Duerson, Gamma Theta 2003 and Montaze Trumbo, Gamma Theta 2004, the idea of a monument was pitched to former members of Gamma Theta and current brothers of Theta Alpha Alpha at the 45th anniversary. The process was not easy, there were countless meetings and presentations and donations totaling \$50,000 from nineteen brothers of Theta Alpha Alpha. Three years later the monument was unveiled. The monument is made of black granite stone with the fraternity's cardinal principles and

escutcheon wrap around the top tier, as well as the fraternity founders with their name, birth, and death dates. Paul says "This monument represents the past, present and future of our glorious chapter and its members. Not only did we want to represent our current members, but those who have died and gone on to Omega Chapter." Duerson also stated, the monument also gives other men on the campus who may be interested in the fraternity a way to see its impact on campus, prompting them to learn more about the Omegas. Brother David Clement, Theta Alpha Alpha Keeper of Finance, was the committee chair who organized the erection of the monument. Clement said. "We are very thankful to Dr. Gary Ransdell for supporting this project from the very start. Without him this would have never been possible. It is great being the first but hopefully not the last; hopefully this will inspire others to leave their mark at WKU." The Gamma Theta Chapter of Omega Psi Phi was founded on the campus of Western Kentucky University on December 14, 1968 and granted its charter June 3,1969. Theta Alpha Alpha was chartered on September 22, 1979 in the city of Bowling Green, KY. Many brothers who reside in the city after college transition from Gamma Theta to Theta Alpha Alpha.

The State Street Food Pantry has provided meals to the community for several years. They also provide baskets for families during Thanksgiving and Christmas and also serve meals weekly. To exhibit the principle of Uplift to the community and to assist them in this endeavor, the brothers of Theta Alpha Alpha donated \$177.85 to their food pantry and we are looking forward to be working with them in the future as they continue to serve and provide assistance to the community.

Brothers were asked to hold a conversation, along with the Bowling Green City Police, with the children about some of the things happening in the United States over the past few years. The main question asked to the students was, "If Martin Luther King Jr. was alive today would he be pleased with what is happening today?" In other class rooms, brothers helped younger students compose original posters for the MLK Jr. March, held the following day. The children came up

with great ideas to put on the posters that dealt with the current situations of society. Some posters boasted hashtags such as "Black Lives Matter" and "Keep the Dream Alive". Once the individual sessions were complete, all the youth were gathered back together in a gymnasium and quizzed about the life of MLK Jr. Once satisfied with the answers given, the brothers rolled up their sleeves and served the children pizza. The children were inquisitive of the fraternity and brothers answered questions as well as they could. The event was a very positive opportunity for the fraternity to show some of the things the brothers do in the community. Men of Quality Life Style Choices Forum

The Theta Omega Chapter Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. hosted the Men of Quality program, for the twenty first consecutive year. This years theme was "Life Style Choices Forum". The forum was held on the University of Louisville campus. More than Six hundred -thirty Middle and High School male students of color came from (JCPS) Jefferson County Public Schools. The students started arrived on campus at 8:30 am where each school was photograph and directed to the great room in the student union building. The Presiding Official Brother Michael Shoulders welcomed the students to the forum. After the invocation by Rev Brother Kenneth Morton there were opening remarks by several dignitaries, Diane Porter, Jefferson County Board of Education; Brother Larry Mucker, Theta Omega Chapter, Basileus; Nathanial Spencer, Black Media Collaborative; Norman Seawright, Jr, UPS Pilot and John Marshall, JCPS Chief Equity Officer. They all acknowledged in high regard the 21 years of service to young men, with this Forum. Before the student broke up into first of two sessions of workshops they heard from the Morning Speaker Dr. Roger Cleveland, Associate Professor, Eastern Kentucky. Dr. Cleveland spoke on closing the achievement gap, transforming school culture and among others. The two session workshops were one hour each. There were ten workshops the students could participate in. Some of the topics were "Conflicts and Resolutions", The Power of the Dollar", "Respect and Responsibilities"," Transition from Middle to High School" and "Dealing with Opposite Sex" among others. After lunch the keynote speaker was Mr. Trabian Shorters, a New York Times bestselling author and founder and CEO of "BMe Community", a network of all races and genders who believe in valuing all members of the human family. His speech to the young men was well received. They were dismissed to head back to schools around 1:30pm. At the end of the day, 2017 was considered by all to be another very successful "Lifestyle **Choices Forum**"

Charter School Rally

The men of Omega from the XI XI chapter supported the Hardin County Education Chair of the Elizabethtown Board of Trustees at a Charter School Rally. The purpose of the event was to protest and discuss pending legislation (HB 520) in the KY House that would have introduced charter schools in the state of Kentucky. Organizers and community allies joined together to educate the community on how charter schools would take resources away from already underfunded public schools. Some of the issues included the potential for segregation of schools, power over the schools being given to an appointed official rather than locally elected representation, and there are also concerns with who controls the money.



Ogelsby wins city council runoff

Bro Erskine Oglesby of the Kappa lota Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity has unseated Chris Anderson in the runoff contest for the District 7 seat on the Chattanooga City Council. Oglesby defeated Anderson, 740 votes to 628. In the city's March 7 election, Anderson fell just short of the required majority to win the seat outright in a three-way race with Oglesby and former councilman Manny Rico. The city charter called for a runoff contest between the candidates who receive the most and second-most votes to decide the issue. Oglesby said in a news release the district needs "a new voice" on the council who "brings a new vision, passion and the necessary business experience to advocate for the needs of our community while bringing people together so we can succeed together and make the progress needed to move our city forward." The candidate has worked as the associate director of corporate engagement for the United Way of Greater Chattanooga, where his job was to grow corporate giving and provide technical and marketing support to nonprofit groups in the region, the release stated. Before that, he was business services representative for the Southeast Tennessee Development District's Tennessee Career Center, where he worked with area businesses and administered training grants and economic development programs. In his statement, Oglesby said Chattanooga "should be known for its social innovations in



reducing crime, growing our workforce, [and] creating economic empowerment opportunities" in a collaboration among government, business and civic and faith-based groups. He said the district's representative should be someone who pushes the city administration for economic development and "works every day to expand the industrial footprint on our community that continues to struggle with overcoming high poverty, high crime rates, record unemployment rates and poor housing conditions."

Save our Children

The Uplift Foundation, the non-profit arm of the Epsilon Phi Chapter Fraternity, Inc. hosted a benefit concert at Berean Baptist Church. The concert was themed as the "Save Our Children" gospel concert. The goal of the concert was to increase community awareness of the youth mentoring programs supported by the Epsilon Phi Chapter and to present the 2017 college scholarship winners.





The scholarship winners competed in an essay contest and the top five were selected from hundreds of entries. The mission of the chapter is to support academic achievement and pursuits of students in the greater Memphis area. Five Memphis area high school seniors were awarded scholarships at this year's gospel concert.




Make The Right Call

The Make the Right Call football camp not only teaches football skills, it also aims to motivate inner city youth in Memphis to achieve success. Growing up in the inner city, Memphis native Brother Gene Robinson of the Epsilon Phi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity used football to earn a full ride to college. A standout defensive back at Whitehaven High School, Robinson went on to the University of North Carolina and started for the Tar Heels. After college, he used that North Carolina degree to launch Genetics Sports Consulting and Events and his Make the Right Call football camp to show inner city kids they too can achieve their goals like he did. "We're talking to them about setting goals," Robinson said. "Always set five goals. Read them every morning when you brush your teeth. That way when you're going to school, beginning your day, you know how to act according to those goals. "Now in its fifth year, the football camp is completely free, which is a big deal. Every year he brings hometown friends to help with the camp and these guys aren't your average Joes. These are



NFL football players from the inner city - guys like Darren Bates of the Tennessee Titans and Dontari Poe of the Atlanta Falcons to show kids how hard work and never settling can bring them success. "To be around guys that came from where they came from and be able to make it," Bates said. "Lets them know that they can make it out. They can do whatever they dream of." "Anytime I can get out here and show them something better," Poe said. "Show them something positive, it's a long-lasting effect on a child this age, so it's really good for me to do." This is 17-year-old Chris Witherspoon's third straight year coming to the football camp. He said he comes back every year because he's seen results from the camp and not just on the football field. "It has taught me to keep pushing," Witherspoon said. "Don't let anybody stop you. The sky's the limit. Well, there is no limit. Don't let anybody put limitations on you. Just keep pushing." As the camp grows, Gene has found new ways to inspire the inner city youth that take part. This year's it's free ACT classes to the top high school performers at the camp.



The Manhood Project

The Brothers of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc., Epsilon Phi Chapter, concluded a community action project titled "The Manhood Project". This project was born out of a conversation about the civil unrest surrounding the Black Lives Matter movement in the summer of 2016. Omega Brothers Irwin Todd and Quincy Snider were discussing ways to get involved with helping our youth not to fall victim to peer pressure, gang activity, and civil disobedience. Riverview Middle School K-8 was chosen because it is in the same community where the Omega Fraternity House is located. Brothers Todd and Snider approached Principle Latasha Harris with their proposal to invest time and talent into speaking with the 6th, 7th and 8th grade males about how "To Engage with Law Enforcement". The Fall 2016 speaking sessions with the young men made a larger impact than the Brothers of Omega could have imagined. The Brothers of Omega Psi Phi were asked by Riverview Middle school liaison Ms. Tamika Williams, a liason with Communities in Schools, to come back in the spring of 2017 and continue to meet with the young men. The Brothers of the Epsilon Phi Chapter accepted the request and tailored the program to expand beyond how to interact with law enforcement. Brothers' Todd and Snider wanted to have a "real" conversation with these young men. Many of the young men do not have their fathers in the house for one reason or another and are raised by a mother or grandmother. The brothers knew they had to talk to the like young black men in their common vernacular and familiar language. At that point, Snider and Todd decided to call the next phase of the program the "Manhood Project". This name symbolized what the brothers wanted to address relative to the "real conversations" How to be a man and what is a man. The brothers also covered such topics such as gangs, personal hygiene, respect for women, careers, self-esteem, and how to start a bank account. This endeavor could not have been successful without the help of a group of Brothers that committed to the program and some of our Brothers that are members of the Memphis Fire and Police Department and the Memphis City Council who contributed their time to speak with these young men.

Communities In Schools Senior Day

In January of this year the men of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc., Epsilon Phi Chapter participated in 100 Men on the 100th Day of school at Riverview Elementary. This was an event where we welcomed the students to school for their 100th day. Coverage of this special day was broadcast on the local news. It then when the men of Omega caught the attention of a representative for Communities in Schools (CIS) organization. This organization focuses on dropout prevention and giving students in their program life tools to advance after graduation. They have a 90% graduation rate for seniors in the program and 92% of students in their program stay in school. As the school year draws to a close, CIS planned a celebration retreat for the graduating seniors who participated in this program from four local high schools: Melrose High, MLK Prep Academy, Hamilton High, and


